Average Response Time

Priority 1: Involved circumstances that pose, or did pose in the immediate past, a clearly defined threat to human life or property and which involve a high level of violence or the potential for serious injury.

Priority 2: Involve circumstances of an urgent, but not life-threatening nature. They are generally disturbances with a potential for violence, minor assaults and batteries, etc.

Priority 3: Involve circumstances which are neither urgent, nor life threatening.

Priority 4: With the exception of several felonies, most past incidents are considered Priority 4.

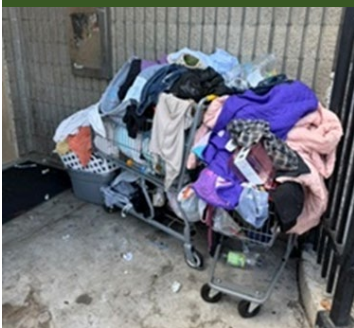


HOMELESS OUTREACH

Sex Offenders | Arson Offenders

The team's responsibilities include conducting sex and arson offender compliance checks, investigate related violations, registration events, and assist investigators and deputies with complex PC290 investigations. In addition, the team is responsible for massage parlor inspections and massage therapist license checks.

Commercial Vehicle & Motor Traffic Enforcement

The Moreno Valley Station Traffic Bureau is subdivided into three teams; Commercial Vehicle Enforcement, Accident Investigations and Motor Traffic Enforcement, who collectively maintain safety for drivers on the roadways of Moreno Valley through enforcement, education, and engineering. The Traffic Bureau conducts school zone traffic enforcement, DUI enforcement saturation patrols, distracted driver enforcement, pedestrian safety enforcement, street racing enforcement, while also working to address issues negatively affecting the quality of life for the residents of Moreno Valley.

CBAT



Community Behavior Assessment Team

CBAT is a cooperative agreement between RUHS-Behavioral Health and the Riverside Sheriff's Office partnering a Clinical Therapist and Deputy Sheriff. The three, two persons teams, assist with crisis mental health services in response to 911 calls. Services include mental health crisis assessments, attempts to divert those in crisis to the lowest level of necessary care, and link those people to outpatient mental health services in an attempt to reduce recidivism.

Notable Cases

CBAT responded to a high-risk incident involving a suicidal male subject who had armed himself with a pistol. CBAT safely removed the subject's wife from the area, established containment, and coordinated ERT resources as needed to ensure the safety of all involved.

Through several minutes of telephone communication and crisis de-escalation efforts, CBAT was able to gain the subject's cooperation and resolve the situation peacefully.

The subject exited the residence without the firearm and was taken into custody without the use of force. The subject's firearms were safely secured and removed from the residence, resulting in a successful resolution and the prevention of further escalation.



Community Service Unit

The Moreno Valley Community Services Unit (CSU) organizes numerous proactive programs designed to strengthen community relationships and provide safety information. The team consist of one Corporal, two Deputies and one Community Service Officer. The team plays a key role in the ongoing safety and wellbeing of our residents. They coordinate neighborhood watch programs, Ride Alongs, Crime Free Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Volunteer and Explorer programs, and Community Programs and events. The Community Services unit serves as a liaison between the community and the City of Moreno Valley.

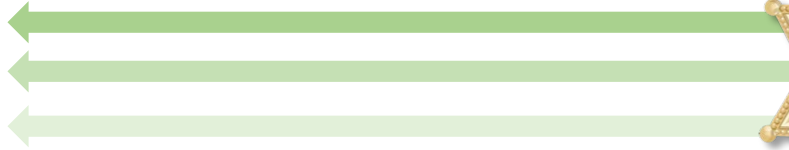

Notable Cases

On 06/30/2026 at approximately 1616 hours, CBAT received a 5150 call for service. The RP reported his brother was driving erratically and threatened to kill himself. The suicidal subject was diagnosed with depression and anxiety. CBAT called the subject in question, and after multiple attempts he eventually answered his cellphone. CBAT clinician Bravo began intervention tactics to de-escalate the subject as he was driving erratically. The subject kept shouting that he was going to kill himself and that he was going to drive off a cliff. The subject was located by CAL-Fire sworn personnel. The subject ultimately pulled over for law enforcement and was detained without incident. The subject was transported to ETS for a 5150 hold. The subject later called and stated he was grateful for CBAT because he would have taken his life if CBAT did not intervene.
